## **SCHEDULE**

Cups are awarded for various classes and sections throughout the show. Details of the cups awarded can be found under each respective section. Points are awarded as follows:

A cup, presented by Mr P. Youngman Carter, will be awarded for the highest points obtained in the show.

### **SECTION 1 - Plants in Pots**

Pots not to exceed 300mm (12ins) in diameter

The Doug South Salver will be awarded for the best exhibit in the potted plant section and a salver, in memory of Mrs Elsie Dye, will be awarded for the best Geranium or Pelargonium (Class 6).

- 2) Single specimen - Cactus or succulent
- 3) Single specimen - Flowering plant
- 4) Single specimen - Fuchsia
- 5) A pot of mixed plants (anything goes)

## SECTION 2 - Cut Flowers

No accessories may be used in classes within this section.

The Anthony Peel Cup will be awarded for the best Single Specimen Rose (Class 14). A cup, presented by Mr H. Bullard, will be awarded for the best two varieties of Perennial Flowers (Class 18).

The Offord Cup will be awarded for the highest points in the Rose classes (Classes 11, 12, 13, 14 & 34) and the final cup in the cut flower section, presented by Mr F. Seabrook, will be awarded for the highest points obtained in the Sweet Pea Classes (Classes 24 - 27).

- 14) A single specimen rose 🏆
- 15) 1 vase of mixed flowers - one colour

- 18) 2 vases of perennial flowers - distinct kind to each vase 🏆
- 19) 1 vase of perennial flowers - distinct kind, no extra foliage
- 20) 1 vase of annuals - one or more varieties (not sweet peas)
- 21) 1 vase of lavender - 7 stems (any variety)
- 22) 2 vases of flowering shrubs - distinct kind to each vase
- 23) 1 vase of penstemon - 3 stems
- 24) 1 vase of pink sweet peas - 7 stems
- 25) 1 vase of red sweet peas - 7 stems
- 26) 1 vase of mauve or lavender sweet peas - 7 stems
- 27) 1 vase of sweet peas - single variety, colour not previously mentioned - 7 stems
- 28) 1 vase of sweet peas - novice entrants only
- 29) Vase of 3 heads of Geranium or Pelargonium - one colour
- 30) Vase of 5 heads of Geranium or Pelargonium - mixed
- 31) Vase of 3 stems of fuchsia

## SECTION 3 - Decorative Classes

Accessories may be used in classes within this section.

A cup, presented by Rebekah Clark, will be awarded for the most points in Section 3.

A cup, presented by Mrs M. Youngman Carter, will be awarded for the best table decoration (Class 35) and a cup presented by Mrs Madden will be awarded for the Best Arrangement of Wild Flowers / Grass (Class 37).

Flowers in Classes 32 - 44 need not be grown by the exhibitor and foliage may be used. No entry to exceed 610mm (24ins) in width or depth unless stated otherwise.

- 33) An arrangement in one colour with any foliage
- 34) An arrangement of roses and rose foliage
- 35) Table decoration (a table, 3ft 6ins x 1ft 9ins will be provided but not a cloth) 🏆

- 37) A collection of known wild flowers, grasses and other wild material for effect 🏆
- 38) A miniature arrangement of flowers - not to exceed 100mm (4ins overall)
- 39) An arrangement of foliage - "Lovely Leaves"
- 40) A themed arrangement - "Country Kitchen"
- 41) A themed arrangement - "To depict a season"
- 42) A floating arrangement not to exceed 300mm (12ins)
- 43) A flower arrangement to include fruit and/or vegetables
- 44) Novice Class - Anything goes

## **SECTION 4 - Amateur Photography**

All photographs in this section must have been taken by the exhibitor. The size of each photograph may not exceed 8ins x 6ins (unless specified) and must not be mounted or framed. Photographs must be staged by the exhibitor.

The Presland Cup will be awarded for the best exhibit in the Amateur Photography Section and a cup will also be awarded for the highest points in the Photography section.

A cup, presented by Anglia Television "The Way We Were", will be awarded for the best collection of fruit and vegetables (Class 89). A cup, presented by Mr A. A. Morris, will be awarded for the highest points awarded for Potatoes (Classes 72 & 73).

A cup, presented by Mr C. Presland, will be awarded for the best exhibit in the Home Produce section. The final cup for the section, presented by Mr G. Cottee, will be awarded for the highest points obtained in the Home Produce section.

## **SECTION 5 - Home Produce Novice Section**

A novice in this case is any exhibitor who has not been placed in a similar fruit or vegetable class in this show in the past. "As grown" where stated below means washed but not trimmed, with all roots and foliage present.

A gardening voucher will be presented to the exhibitor with the most points in the Novice section.

- 94) A medley of vegetables and/or fruit as grown, presented in a trug or similar
- 95) 3 potatoes – any kind
- 96) 5 strawberries
- 97) 3 stalks of rhubarb

## **SECTION 6 - Cultivated Garden**

Gardens are judged using a standard set of criteria which ensures different sizes gardens are judged equally.

The gardens are to be judged on **Saturday 27th June 2020** and a cup, presented by Mr D. A. South, will be awarded for the Best Garden.

## **SECTION 7 - School Classes**

This section is open to children attending St. Nicholas School, Tolleshunt D'Arcy. The work is to be completed at school and the classes will be arranged by the Headteacher.

## **SECTION 8 - Cookery & Preserves**

All entries must be made by the exhibitor. Exhibits with an asterix \* are to be baked in a 7 - 8 inch diameter tin.

A cup, presented by Val & Roy Brown, will be awarded for the highest points in the Cookery and Preserves section.

- 103) Display of 4 different rolls, 2 of each type, 8 in total
- 104) 6 cheese straws

## **SECTION 9 - Handicrafts**

All entries in this section must have been made by the exhibitor. A cup presented by Mrs O. Tanner, in memory of Mr G. Tanner, will be awarded for the best exhibit in the Handicrafts section. A Cup will be awarded for the best exhibit in Classes 139 & 141 in memory of Mr Gilbert Dye.

## SECTION 11 - Children's Classes

All entries in this section must have been made by the exhibitor.

Entry is free for children's classes but donations are always welcome. Entrants in this section must not be older than 16 at the time of the show unless otherwise stated. In all cases the child's age must be included on the entry form and will be made known to the judges

The Joan Scott Memorial Trophy will be awarded for the best handwriting sample for exhibitors aged 5 - 7 years (Class 150) and the Brian Scott Memorial Trophy will be awarded for the best handwriting sample for exhibitors aged 8 - 11 years (Class 151).

A cup presented by Mr D. A. South will also be awarded for the best exhibit in the children's classes.

150) Specimen of handwriting - nursery rhyme (exhibitor aged 5 to 7)



151) Specimen of handwriting - short poem (exhibitor aged 8 to 11) 

152) Photograph of an animal(s) to be taken by the exhibitor

153) Make a caterpillar using any craft material - no more than 45cm (18ins)

154) A Jurassic scene on a paper plate - plate no more than 20cm (8ins)

155) An imaginary animal made from vegetables or fruit

156) A decorated biscuit - biscuit may be bought (exhibitor aged 7 and under)

157) A collage using wild materials (exhibitors aged 8 and over)

158) An arrangement of flowers in a toy

159) Six decorated cup cakes

160) Six jam tarts

161) A handmade bookmark

162) Make a totem pole – adults and children, one entry per family

163) A snake in any medium

164) A picture in any other medium (can be computer generated)

## RECIPE

### Lemon Drizzle Cake

110g (4oz) softened butter

170g (6oz) caster sugar

Grated rind of 1 lemon

170g (6oz) self-raising flour

5 tbsp milk

2 eggs

For the syrup: 85g (3oz) icing sugar plus the juice of 1 lemon.

Grease and line a loaf tin. Put all the cake ingredients into a bowl, mix well and beat until smooth. Turn into the prepared tin and smooth until level. Bake at 350°F, 180°C, Gas Mark 4 for 55 minutes or until a skewer pressed into the centre comes clear. Remove from oven but leave in tin.

To prepare the syrup put icing sugar and lemon juice into a small pan and heat gently until the sugar has melted. Prick the top surface of the cake with a fork or skewer and gently pour the syrup over the cake making sure that the syrup penetrates the small holes you have made.

Don't worry if it goes down the sides of the cake, this will only enhance the flavour. Leave in the tin to cool.
